Features of Higo Peony

What makes it different from other peonies?

A large flower with a single layer of petals and a protruding center

They can grow as large as 30 cm in diameter The big petals bloom like a lotus flower 100-200 golden stamens in the center!

How many subtypes are there? There are 30 different cultivated varieties.

History of the Higo Peony

Higo Peony has the longest history among the Higo Rokka

- 1751-1763 Cultivated as medicinal plants at Banjien \rightarrow Grown for decorative purposes
- 1795 Nakano Sukenoshin, a retainer of the Higo Domain, publishes *Review of Peonies* under the pen name *Hakucho* that describes and establishes cultivation and appreciation methods and the art of flowerbed making
- 1826-1860 Hanaren groups are formed, producing new flower varieties and developing breeding and cultivation methods
- 1900-1910's Cultivated varieties are narrowed down from 500 to just 100
- 1939-1945 World War II \Rightarrow Many varieties are lost
- 1970's Various cultivators come together to form the preservation group Hakucho-kai and share their expertise (*the group is currently in recess)

Through the work of several successors, the cultivation methods and purebred varieties continue to be preserved!

OHOW Do You Make Higo Peony Bloom Large?

Factors like long roots, replanting every couple years, wide planting grounds with ample sunlight, and proper irrigation and fertilization are important

Growing peonies in flower pots is difficult!

Flowerbed cultivation is the best method!

History of Higo Rokka

Beginning in the 1700s,

The 6th Hosokawa Lord of the Kumamoto Domain, Hosokawa Shigekata (1720-1785) encouraged clansmen to practice horticulture as a form of self- discipline.

- In the 1800s, during the reign of 10th-generation Hosokawa Narimori
 - (1804-1860), the clansmen formed an enthusiast group called

Hanaren to establish new varieties of flowers and set rules to grow them.

Taking flowers, seedlings, or seeds out of the group was prohibited!

In 1960, six flower varieties that could be enjoyed during all four seasons

were selected for an exhibition held in the presence of the Emperor.

These six types of flower have been collectively called Higo Rokka ever since.
